- In July 2023, Boston Children's finalized an institutional affiliation with Franciscan Children's to enhance the system of behavioral health care and improve care for children with complex rehab needs
- The partnership includes creating a state-of-theart new building for children's mental health and rehab needs on Franciscan's Brighton campus
- As a result of this opportunity, there is a new funding opportunity for community organizations





Determination of Need Community Health Initiatives



- Massachusetts is one of 35 states with a Determination of Need Community Health Initiative program, regulated by the MA Department of Public Health
- The State requires 5% of capital project costs to be allocated to community health initiatives
- Required community engagement process
- Opportunity to build and expand community partnerships

Initiative Overview

Goal: expand and diversify the pipeline of trained mental and behavioral health professionals and graduate students who work with children and youth.

Grant funding will support creative community partnerships to prepare diverse individuals using cohort-based models and trauma informed approaches.

Two focus areas:

- Pathways for paraprofessional
- Preparing diverse graduate students

Paraprofessionals or students from underrepresented backgrounds (racial, ethnic, cultural, LGBTQ+, language).





Focus area 1: Pathways for paraprofessionals

Expand pathways for mental and behavioral health paraprofessionals serving children, youth, and families to enter, stay, and grow in the field.

Target Applicants:

- Nonprofit healthcare and community health organizations
- Nonprofit workforce development organizations
- Nonprofit educational institutions





Focus area 2: Preparing diverse graduate students

Help educational institutions attract and prepare diverse underrepresented graduate students to:

- Pursue graduate degree in mental and behavioral health at a waived or reduced rate with onsite or online learning options and/or
- 2) Provide cohort-based supervision and/or licensure support for early career professionals or recent graduates in community, outpatient, or inpatient settings

Target Applicants:

 Public or private educational institutions offering graduate degrees with a focus on child, youth, and/or family mental and behavioral health





Grants Overview

- Three-year grants: June 1, 2025 May 31, 2028
- May apply for \$200,000 per year (\$600,000 total)
- Total funding available: \$2.4 million
 - Anticipate funding up to 4 projects
 - Competitive process
 - Selection committee comprised of Boston Children's staff as well as external and community representatives



Eligibility & Priorities



Eligible Institutions and priorities:

- Nonprofit organizations with 501 C3 status
- Workforce development organizations with experience in healthcare
- Healthcare organizations
- Public or private educational institutions
- Cohort-based models that foster a sense of belonging and shared commitment
- Trauma-informed and culturally responsive approaches
- Paraprofessionals or students from underrepresented backgrounds (racial, ethnic, cultural, LGBTQ+, language)

Ineligible:

- Philanthropic organizations
- Clinical services
- Capital improvements in healthcare or other facilities
- Practices or entities owned by Franciscan Children's or Boston Children's may serve as collaborators but cannot receive funds

Projects located in or serving children and youth in our priority neighborhoods:

- Allston
- Brighton
- Dorchester

- East Boston
- Hyde Park
- Jamaica Plain

- Mattapan
- Mission Hill
- Roxbury



Selection Criteria



- 1. Track record of meaningful training, supervision and support of diverse professionals and connection to the community
- 2. Alignment with the initiative's strategy, priority populations, and priority geographies
- Clear and comprehensive description of the need and how the proposed project will address it with an equity focus
- Potential for positive impact on expanding and diversifying the children's mental and behavioral health workforce
- 5. Outcomes that are relevant, measurable, and achievable
- 6. Strong community partnerships
- 7. Sufficient staff capacity and expertise to successfully implement project
- 8. Strong plans to embed project into ongoing efforts with budget that accurately reflects the level of project effort and shared financial commitment



Submission Process



To be considered, proposals must be submitted in the online portal by **Friday**, **February 7**th **by 5:00 p.m.**

Tips for submission

- Collaborators can be added but only the lead user can Submit.
- Click **Submit** so that your application is received. You will receive a confirmation email.
- Prepare your responses in a Word document then copy into the online application.
- Your work can be saved as you go.





Application Sections and Required Documents


- 1. Cover Letter: include amount of funding requested and key contact information
- 2. Proposal Narrative: 17 questions
- 3. Project Budget (template provided)
- 4. Scope of Services (template provided)
- 5. Organizational Budget
- 6. Resumes/CVs for project staff
- 7. W-9 Tax Form for organization or fiscal sponsor
- 8. Two Letters of Support (from someone outside of your organization)
- 9. Partnership Letter stating commitment and role of each partner organization



Funding Expectations




- Completed Grant Agreement with Supporting Documents
- Evaluation reporting through online portal twice a year (December/June)
- Participation in annual meetings and learning sessions
- Periodic check ins with Boston Children's Hospital
